Nepalese alumnae Prabha and Chhiring received a PDF grant to support their project in Nepal. The Aakar project's main objective is to empower, generate interest for community involvement and provide leadership training to youths in the community. It provides hands-on training in creative solution designing and project management to high school age students in Nepal that they can then use to address a social issue they see in their local community over a 3-month period.

"We really appreciate Pestalozzi's commitment to making a difference in deserving communities. The PDF has empowered Pestalozzi alumni like us to have a direct impact on our community and even start up social enterprises. Chhiring and I are grateful for this opportunity," Prabha shared.

This year Aakar supported ten young people who were appointed mentors. The projects covered such subjects as waste management, social health issues, financial literacy, cervical cancer

screening and social media addiction.

Yubraj was awarded 1st place for best overall project, which was focused on helping other young people moderate their use of social media and form more useful habits. Over 8 weeks he carried out surveys, workshops, and discussions in 3 different schools to help students understand the issue and its effects and to provide them with resources and ideas to change habits. Yubraj developed skills around doing online research, designing educational materials, public speaking, communication, leadership and time management.



"My message to Pestalozzi donors would just be... Thank you. You made a big difference in my life. FLO FOUNDATION CLEAN WATER PROJECT



How many times a day do you turn on the taps in your home or at work? To wash your hands, make a cup of tea, wash clothes, or just to have a glass of water that is safe to drink?

Access to drinking water and sanitation is a fundamental human right and core to sustainable development (SDG6). Unfortunately, many rural and underserved communities in Nigeria lack this basic resource with women and children often the most vulnerable groups.

Pestalozzi provided a grant to the FLO Foundation to construct an effective hand pump borehole to benefit the community living in Kewaye village, northern Nigeria.

The community of approximately 800 have battled with a lack of clean and accessible water, which has put them in a critical situation and hindered broader development. Through providing the handpump we have reduced the need for long

treks, sometimes multiple times a day, to fetch water. Despite several challenges, including getting a heavy drilling machine over soft soil, the project was completed successfully. The hand pump construction has been welcomed by the community who assisted and cooperated in the project when required.

FLO representatives return to Kewaye a few weeks after the hand pump was installed to evaluate the impact of the borehole on the local community.

One resident stated, 'We are very happy with the borehole. Now we don't have to trek so far. Our children are delighted. Having clean water very close to us is such a blessing.'

Access to water has also improved personal hygiene, enabling the residents to live a healthier and more hygienic lifestyle.







Hauwa, from Nigeria, was a student at Pestalozzi from 1973-78. She eventually completed her tertiary education in Nigeria with a BSc in Accounting. Hauwa is an accountant by profession and having recently retired from a managerial position at a manufacturing company is currently freelancing at a capital market company. She is also a member of the advisory council for the FLO Foundation.

'As a student and now an alumna of Pestalozzi, the high esteem I hold for the institution remains unwavering. I am eternally grateful for the positive impact it has had on my life. The education I received both inside and outside the classroom has shaped me into the person I am today. Pestalozzi creates a conducive learning environment for its students to thrive and develop longlasting friendships. I am lucky to have formed great friendships and acquired memorable experiences, which I will cherish forever. I still consider the Pestalozzi Village my home and my fellow alumni as family.

As a mother of four, I raised my children to be compassionate and to have a sense of empathy for the less privileged, a value that was instilled in me at Pestalozzi. My youngest child, Ruqayyat, seized this passion and founded the FLO Foundation. Consequently, the goals and objectives of FLO Foundation, which is centred on promoting quality education and promoting development, directly aligns with the mission of Pestalozzi. I am deeply proud to be an alumna and to be living out the Pestalozzi dream through my children and the FLO Foundation.'







Bernice (' 19) is from St. Matthews Village, Belize. During a gap year she ran a Financial Literacy training course and had a part time internship at the Human Rights Commission of Belize. She is studying Economics and Business Administration (Accounting) at Berea College, USA.

How would things have been different had you not received the Pestalozzi scholarship?

The scholarship was a springboard to my success in securing a fully funded scholarship at Berea College. It would have been difficult for me to continue my studies without the support of Pestalozzi.

What are you currently doing to 'pay it forward'?

This summer, I was accepted into Berea College's prestigious Entrepreneurship for the Public Good (EPG) program, where I worked with the local community and business partners in rural Eastern Kentucky to help revitalize their economies hindered by the effects of coal mining. Our team created digital asset inventories documenting 100+ assets and points of interest for several counties in Kentucky. I'm part of the Rotaract executive board; I'm a Teaching Assistant providing tutoring in Economics and Accounting 1, as well as serving on the Kentucky Economics Association board.

What are your plans for the future? How do you hope to help your home community?

I plan to gain work experience in the U.S. in various financial industries. I also hope to pursue my master's degree in Law since, after participating in MOOT Court, my professor and even Circuit Court judges commented that I was a "natural in the field." Long-term, I plan to launch the Stars of Belize Foundation, to provide mentoring and scholarship opportunities for Belizean students entering high school.

Why is education important?

An education offers one the ability to expand horizons and break barriers such as poverty and access to basic resources. It equips generations with the confidence and means to make more meaningful impacts in their communities that would otherwise be impossible.

What message would you give to our donors?

Your contributions will continue to make the dreams of many young people like myself come true! An investment in education is never wasted.

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What is your job and when did you become a Pestalozzi Trustee?

I'm currently COO at Feedr, a tech platform that enables businesses to administer subsidised food for employees without having a canteen. I joined Pestalozzi in March 2020. I've always been involved in charitable organisations, having started at school. Doing the IB really solidified volunteering as part of my life, as CAS (Creativity, Activity,

Service) hours are mandatory for the qualification. I think that's one of the most important requirements as it truly changes how you perceive your role in society. Now that's how I think about volunteering – it's mandatory in life!

Why did you become a Pestalozzi Trustee?

Primarily, I was drawn to Pestalozzi's ambition and mission in providing world class education to high calibre young adults. I truly believe that nearly all (if not all!) global problems can be solved with education – it is the foundation underpinning all global development goals. Having previously volunteered for a large organisation, I also wanted to join a smaller team that can be more agile and where my impact will be felt more strongly.

What do you wish other people knew about Pestalozzi?

How amazing each and every one of our students is, how determined they are and how hard they work. Knowing some of the personal stories of the students who we have been sponsoring since the time I joined, I am always humbled by how much they have achieved (and will achieve in the future) despite all the adversity they have faced in their life.

What is your hope for Pestalozzi in the future?

To help as many students as possible to achieve their ambition, develop well-rounded global citizens and have a seat at the table of shaping the world of tomorrow.

Yousef Sayeed (Yousef Said Ibrahim Eisa) passed away peacefully on 17 September in Amman, Jordan. He was a Pestalozzi student from 1966-75.

Lt-Col Sir Simon Bland KCVO passed away on 11 August 2022. After a distinguished career in the army, he was for many years Private Secretary to the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester. He was a Trustee in the 1990s, later joined the Council and was elected an Honorary Vice President before stepping down in 2009.
