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Update from Sue Walton, Chief Executive Officer

Those of you who have been following our website and Facebook updates will already be aware of the excitement that has been building here in the Village as we launch the Pestalozzi-UWC Scholarship Programme. We are delighted to have agreed a partnership with United World Colleges who share our passion for empowerment through education (page 9). Our first cohort will join Atlantic College in Wales this autumn.

We were pleased to announce PGL Limited as the estate's new owners in February (page 10). One consequence of the sale is that we will rent office space locally in Hastings to accommodate our small team. (Look for more news on this in the next Newsletter.) Another is that as we no longer own a village we have changed our name to better reflect what we do. The 'Pestalozzi International Foundation' will not only continue to provide scholarships, we will also give our more recent alumni access to a Development Fund to help them set up their own charities and social enterprises.

Of course alongside the thrill of launching a new programme there are inevitably endings to celebrate. One that I found particularly moving was our final International Women's Day event focusing on modern day slavery. Pestalozzi students performed an extraordinary and thought-provoking play, written by one of their number, Harvard-bound Prabidhik KC, about the sex-trafficking of young women in Nepal.



I would like to thank you, Pestalozzi's supporters, without whom none of the achievements that you read about in this Newsletter would have been possible. Pestalozzi's future is bright and I hope that you will remain part of it, giving young people like Alvin, Rufaro and Kazembe (page 6) the precious gift of an education.

This is the last update that I will write as Pestalozzi's CEO before I step down at the end of August. It has been a real privilege to serve truly inspirational young people and work alongside a remarkable and dedicated staff team. Thank you all for making my job such a pleasure.

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Off to university

This autumn thirteen Pestalozzi students and alumni will be continuing their education at some of the world's top universities after securing highly-coveted scholarships.

Current Pestalozzi students have received conditional offers from six of the top American universities where they will study subjects ranging from International Relations to Biochemistry.

Six Pestalozzi alumni who left the Village in 2018 have also obtained places at universities across the world after taking a valuable gap year to complete projects and work experience back in their home countries.

Congratulations to all of our students and alumni for your achievements.



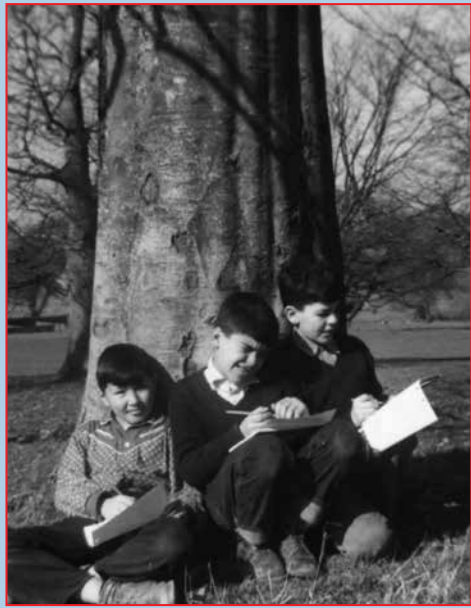

Early Pestalozzi Children: George's Story



George O. Krmadjian was one of the first European children to arrive in the Village when it opened its doors in 1959. After completing his secondary education he returned to Germany but found he was drawn back to the Village a number of years later to work here. Here is George's Pestalozzi story explaining how Pestalozzi made a difference in his life.

I arrived at the Pestalozzi Village on the 2nd of February 1961 as part of the first group of refugee children from Germany. For us children this was like a dream come true and given time we developed into one big family. There were 60 children and 15 different nationalities. We were lucky to have highly qualified staff and wonderful house parents to look after us.

My brother and sister who came to the Village with me in 1961 left

in 1964, but I stayed on until I'd finished my exams at Claverham Community College. From 1964 to 66 I also went to a local drama school which was my real passion.

I returned to Germany in 1966 as my father was very ill. I met my wife Barbara in 1970 and we married in June 1971. There wasn't much future in drama and acting so I decided to continue studying. After four years I successfully finished a course in social studies specialising in working with youth and young adults. My experience at Pestalozzi gave me the motivation to want to give back and help

young people, just like I'd been helped when I was younger.

In the following years I worked in a youth detention centre, as head of a youth club. I'd always kept in touch with Pestalozzi during this time and decided that I'd like to go back and work there. In 1990 I was offered the position of College House Warden at the Pestalozzi Village, which I accepted, and was happy to move back to England with my family. I now had the opportunity to give back some of the experiences I had the chance to enjoy at the Pestalozzi Village.

I lived at the Village with my wife and children for a number of years, my children went to school with the Pestalozzi students and the cycle continued. My son, Kevin, like me also decided to return to the Pestalozzi Village to work and was a member of the estate team in 2014.

It is clear to see that Pestalozzi has played a very important part in my life and my family's lives and I'm glad that I'm part of the Pestalozzi family.

First IB Students: Senamiso's Story

Senamiso Mathobela is a Pestalozzi alumna and was in the first group of students to study the IB course when the programme changed in 1997. She is now making a difference both in her professional and personal life.

Senamiso currently works as a Power System Engineer at the National Grid, the electricity and gas transmission company.

She recently became the first woman control engineer in the National Grid Transmission Centre. This is an achievement she is rightly proud of and one she says she could not have managed without Pestalozzi.

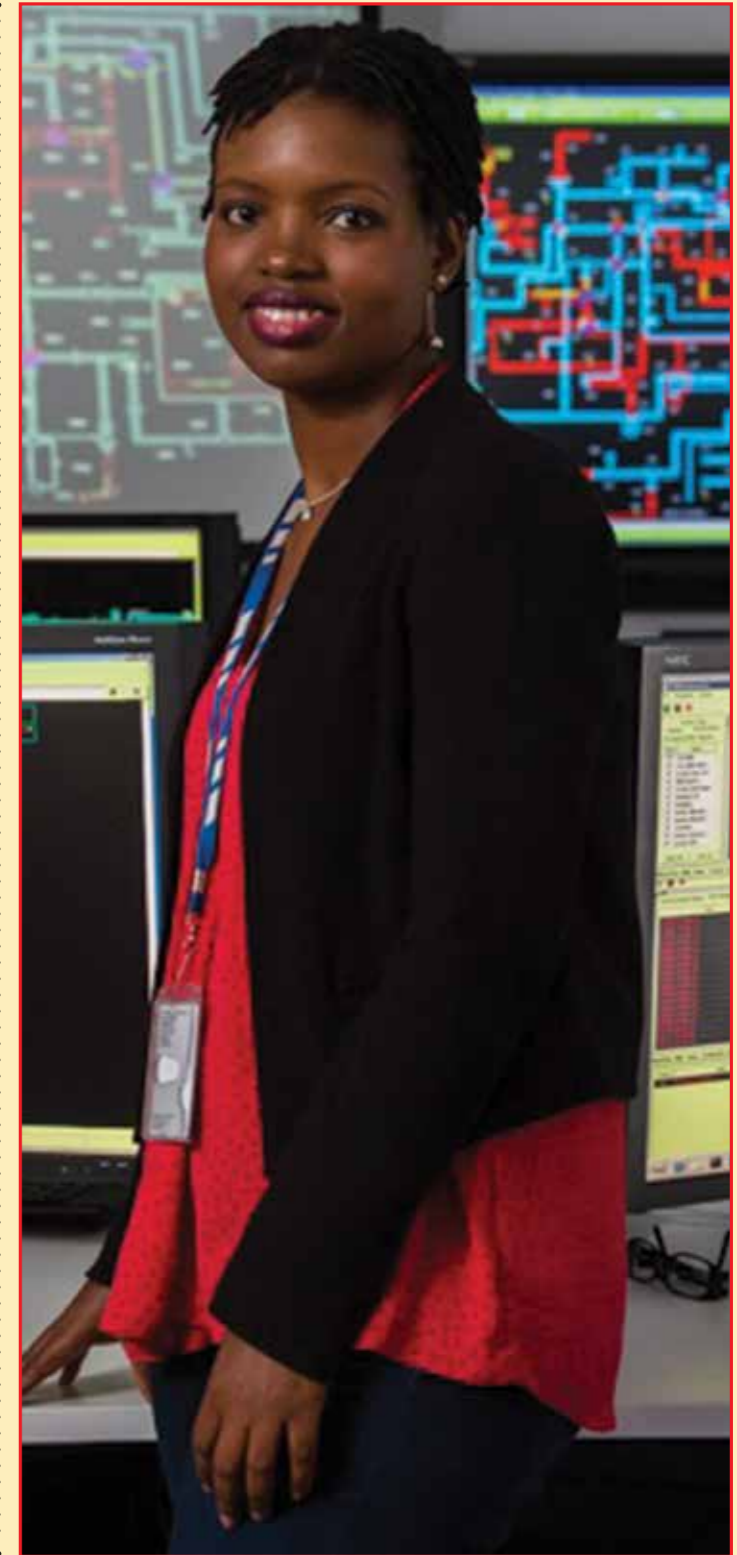
As a child in Zimbabwe, Senamiso's dreams were limited to an immediate and narrow world. A Pestalozzi scholarship opened up her horizons. She grew to believe in herself and her self-confidence led her to pursue a career in engineering - her passion from a young age.

Senamiso left Pestalozzi to study Electrical Engineering at the University of Zimbabwe. After graduating she worked at the National Electricity Control Centre in Zimbabwe, and dreamed of operating in a larger system with bigger operational challenges. She read about the UK National Grid and when a job came up on their website, she applied and was successful. Now she aspires to leadership roles within the company.

"I am very grateful to the sponsors of Pestalozzi for giving me the opportunity to receive such a good education - and for giving me the confidence to go out into the world and make a difference," said Senamiso.

She is an active advocate for inclusion and diversity in her company, working as part of a steering group to promote diversity at all levels. Outside of work she volunteers with Girl Guides. All this is driven by her desire to be a role model for young women from similar backgrounds, and to show them it is possible to achieve their dreams.

"Looking back I realise I could not have done any of this without the help of the Pestalozzi International Village," explained Senamiso "and now it is my turn to help others in the same way."

When something is unpredictable, generally it brings inconvenience. For example, unpredictable weather can make people skeptical of outdoor plans and unpredictable moods can cause uncertainty in social interactions. However, sometimes I think it's great that the future is unpredictable. Due to its unpredictability there's fun in taking risks, making plans and working constantly towards a goal that nobody but you can see.

Whilst studying for my A Levels at Pestalozzi, I got the opportunity to hear others' dreams. Seeing my friends from Africa to East Asia to Central America working on ambitious goals, I was captivated

by the beauty of optimism – whatever it was for. It was then that I realised that the shortest bridge between a dream and reality is planning.

When Mags Alexander interviewed me for the Pestalozzi Scholarship in 2014, I said I would work on my personal development for the next five years and then I would start creating opportunities for

others alongside my career. It's now been five years and I recently took a semester leave from my college to start Mero Dream, a career counseling agency in Pokhara, Nepal that helps students connect with experts in their field of interest. I believe that through Mero Dream, students will get authentic counseling from professionals on how to achieve their career goals which will help to develop the economy in Nepal.

During this gap semester, I've also been networking with policy-makers

and politicians in Nepal. I met with former Prime Ministers, played Holi with the incumbent cabinet of ministers and worked on policy-level projects at the Ministry of Tourism and Civil Aviation. It gave me a unique opportunity to see how politicians interact, debate and discuss various issues of national and international importance.

No one can predict the future. But that gives us the opportunity to envision the invisible and predict the unpredictable. For me, just knowing that if I work hard enough I can be whatever I dream to be, is fulfilling.

Pestalozzi to me was a dream house. I know that my story would have been rather gloomy had I not been given the Pestalozzi experience. I'm indebted forever to Pestalozzi and its broader community.



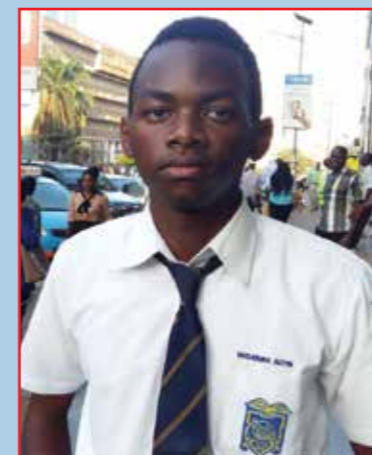

First Pestalozzi-UWC Scholars

The Pestalozzi scholarship programme is changing, and from September of this year five bright and ambitious students will be attending Atlantic College in Wales to undertake the International Baccalaureate Diploma with United World Colleges. They will be the first Pestalozzi-UWC scholars on the new programme. As we go to print three young people have been confirmed. Here is why this opportunity will change their lives.

Alvin Mugarura – Uganda

Alvin Mugarura is from Uganda and wants to bring Peace to his country. The district that he lives in is the most insecure in Uganda. A few years ago hundreds of people were killed in a rebel raid, including his father. Even though this caused suffering and destruction for his family and community, it didn't stop Alvin working hard at school so he can pursue his dream of becoming an engineer. He's also interested in Business Studies so is excited to have the opportunity to explore this subject area at Atlantic College so he can broaden his knowledge and understanding.



Dechen Chokey – Tibet

Dechen is an orphan from the Tibetan Children's Village Chauntra in Himachal Pradesh, northern India. She is very engaged in a range of extracurricular activities from guiding younger children with their academic studies and mentoring to cleaning the campus. Motivated by the lack of an effective and accessible healthcare system in her country and the loss of her father to cancer Dechen aspires to be an Oncologist.

Rufaro Russell Gamariel – Zimbabwe

Rufaro Russell Gamariel is a 17 year old self-motivated young man with a dream of making a meaningful contribution to the medical world. He's always been fascinated by mathematics and has developed an interest in Biology and Chemistry. In the future he wants to become a Neurosurgeon. Here is what Rufaro has to say about what the Pestalozzi-UWC scholarship means to him:

"I look forward to starting the Pestalozzi-UWC scholarship. I believe such an opportunity is going to help me achieve my dream. With world class facilities and the multi-cultural environment at UWC Atlantic College, I really look forward to gaining an all-round education as a scientist and leader, building on what I have already accomplished.

I'm very grateful for being chosen to receive the Pestalozzi-UWC Scholarship. It means that I don't have worry about anything else, enabling me to concentrate on my studies so that at the end of the scholarship, I can continue my journey to becoming a Neurosurgeon with a solid foundation."

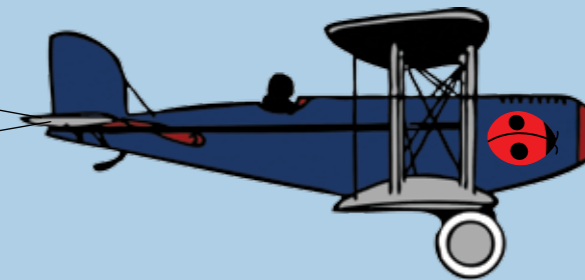

1959

The first children arrive in the village – some from Europe and some from the UK.

1947

Pestalozzi Children's Village Trust is founded as a charity by Dr Henry Alexander and Mrs Mary Buchanan and fundraising begins.

1957

The 170 acre Oaklands Estate in Sedlescombe is purchased by the charity Trustees.

1963

22 Tibetan children arrive at the village, marking a new geographical direction for the charity.

1968

The last of the Europeans leave the village and the charity begins to offer opportunities to a wider range of children from some of the world's poorest communities.

1997

Hastings College of Arts and Technology works closely with Pestalozzi to introduce the International Baccalaureate Diploma. Pestalozzi begins to offer IB scholarships to high achieving low income 16-20 year-olds to allow them to complete their secondary education in the UK.

2003

Pestalozzi Children's Village Trust becomes Pestalozzi International Village Trust.

2012

The Ministerial directive to treat Pestalozzi students as 'British' for the purposes of education is overturned by the EFA, increasing the charity's costs by £200,000 per annum.

2015

The IB ceases and students start studying an enhanced A-Level programme.

2016

Claremont Sixth Form enrolls five Pestalozzi students to study A Levels. The educational partnership is a success and all Pestalozzi scholars attend Claremont from 2017 until June 2019.

2019

April: Pestalozzi sells the estate to PGL Limited to fund the continuation of the scholarship programme. An exciting new partnership is agreed with United World Colleges and the first students are selected to attend Atlantic College in Wales to study the IB Diploma.

May: Pestalozzi International Village Trust is renamed the Pestalozzi International Foundation to better reflect the new programme.

June: A fund is set up to make small grants to alumni wishing to start their own charities or social enterprises.

The Pestalozzi-UWC Partnership

We are delighted to be able to share the news of our exciting new scholarship programme and partnership with UWC (United World Colleges). The Pestalozzi-UWC Scholarship Programme launches this autumn when our first cohort of students will be starting a two-year International Baccalaureate Diploma course at UWC Atlantic College in the Vale of Glamorgan (Wales, UK).

As we explored options to continue our programme of support for the education of high achieving low income young people, we asked our current students and alumni what the most important elements of their scholarship were. The overwhelming response was that living in an international community where difference and diversity were both welcome and embraced was crucial. We also wanted the new programme to encompass Pestalozzi's ethos of holistic education for Head, Heart and Hands. Our new partner meets all of these criteria.

UWC is a global family of schools and colleges with a powerful

difference. With a shared goal of working towards global peace and sustainability, they bring together young people from around the world to study in one of their 18 schools on four continents. We believe that UWC's mission "to make education a force to unite people, nations and cultures for peace and a sustainable future" is so closely aligned to Pestalozzi's own that our scholars will thrive in their multi-faith, multi-cultural community in the same way that they have here in Sedlescombe. UWC Atlantic College is a residential facility, so all new Pestalozzi students will live at St. Donat's Castle where currently up to 90 different nationalities are represented.



"We are proud to have joined forces with a like-minded partner like the Pestalozzi International Foundation", said Jens Waltermann, Executive Director at UWC International. "The Pestalozzi-UWC Scholarship Programme allows us to provide more deserving young students with access to high quality education and help them gain the skills that are needed to make change happen in today's world."

We look forward to growing this successful partnership and empowering globally conscious leaders to celebrate diversity and build the bridges we so urgently need today."

One of UWC's strengths is its network of national committees based in more than 155 countries around the world, who promote the UWC movement and select students locally. From the outset UWC were keen to work with us to ensure that all of our selection criteria could be met with final selection decisions made by us. Our initial focus will be on the nine countries that we currently select from, but UWC's global network means that, funding permitting, we could support young people from almost any developing country in the world.

What will always remain a constant is that Pestalozzi scholarships provide students with an opportunity they would not otherwise receive,

developing their potential and knowledge to positively impact the lives of many others. Your support ensures our programme is able to break the cycle of intergenerational poverty equipping these young people to make a real and lasting difference in the world.

Outdoor education comes back to the Pestalozzi Village

There has been a great deal of speculation regarding the future of the Village and we are delighted to announce that PGL Travel Limited, the UK's leading outdoor education provider, is the new owner. Selling the estate was not an easy decision but Pestalozzi's Board of Trustees recognised that this was necessary to ensure the continuation of the organisation's work with high achieving, low income young people.

Pestalozzi and PGL were both established in 1957 and have excellent track records of providing educational opportunities to young people.



We've spoken to Bruce Garrod, PGL's Operations Manager for the UK, regarding PGL and the estate.

Q: Bruce, what does PGL do and what is your role?

I am the Operations Manager for the UK. Since 1957 we too have offered children from the UK and overseas opportunities to learn and grow. We are delighted to have recently acquired the Pestalozzi site and know it well having successfully run Outdoor Education programmes here in the past.

Q: Local parents probably know PGL as 'Parents Get Lost' but what does PGL actually stand for?

Named after its founder, Peter Gordon Lawrence, PGL are



proud to share an aim with Pestalozzi village to develop young people.

Q: We know it is early days yet but when do you think PGL Pestalozzi will be open for business?

Our immediate focus has been very much on our short term plans and we intend to refurbish the existing accommodation blocks this autumn and welcome our first guests in spring next year.

Q: You recently had the opportunity to speak at the Sedlescombe Parish Annual Assembly. How do you see PGL working with the local community in the future? Will there be any activities or events that local people can get involved in?

We intend to be part of the community and where possible we will look to use local suppliers and of course we will create a number of jobs to provide our guests with a unique learning experience. Our management



team and in the future our centre staff look forward to getting to know all our neighbours in Sedlescombe.

Q: Do you think PGL will want to take advantage of the planning consents that Pestalozzi had for new accommodation blocks on the site?
We will soon have a clearer picture of our customers' more long term needs, we plan to ensure that the community are aware of these through meetings and a formal planning consultation process.

Q: It is great that PGL are keeping the name 'Pestalozzi' for the site. Is there any other way that you might be able to commemorate the 60 years of Pestalozzi in Sedlescombe?

We have decided to keep the highly regarded Pestalozzi name to recognise the impact that the village has had on generations of children and students.

What has the Pestalozzi experience taught you?

Bernice Ramirez - "The Pestalozzi experience has taught me to embrace change, no matter how hard it hits you and to always remember that if there's a will there's definitely a way!"

What has been your Pestalozzi highlight?

Kinzang Wangmo - "It definitely has to be meeting people from 9 different countries and more. It is just amazing to get their input on some of the things that are happening around the world on a daily basis which may not be in line with what I believe in or my faith. I think that's where the real beauty of diversity and learning lies."

How do you feel Pestalozzi has changed you as a person?

Prabidhik KC - "Pestalozzi has changed me academically, socially, and emotionally. It brought me from a small corner of the globe and showed me the whole world. It has paved the beautiful path in my life. Coming here, I have become more mature, resilient, and global."



What are you going on to do after Pestalozzi?

Tenzin Jampa - "I hope to pursue theoretical physics in university. I wish to dedicate this life of mine to discover truths of the universe largely for the satisfaction of my own curiosity but also so our successors can live in a world more understood and less dangerous because the things we fear are the things we are ignorant of."

What do you want to be doing in five years' time?

Olivia Marito - "I would like to undertake volunteering or an internship that focuses on advancing science and technology."

How do you want to make a difference in the future?

Joellyn Lumbantobing - "I want to go back to my country after gaining experience from my time abroad. I imagine myself helping Indonesia in the area of nutrition."

Mags Alexander, Pestalozzi's Student Programme Manager, has been working at the Village in Sedlescombe for 15 years. Mags has seen many changes and worked with almost 300 students, helping them through their college education and onto university. Mags will be continuing her work with Pestalozzi when the new programme starts in September, taking her on the next stage of her exciting Pestalozzi journey.

It only seems like yesterday that I moved into the picturesque village in Sedlescombe to take up my position as Care Coordinator. Just over fifteen enjoyable, and at times perplexing, years have sped by. During that time I have overseen the student programme for 288 students and have met many more alumni from across the decades.

As we leave the Pestalozzi site I will be the third longest serving member of staff still with the organisation. What has motivated me to stay with the charity so long? It has been the camaraderie of my staff team during difficult times and having the pleasure of working alongside and supporting some of the brightest and most driven students I have ever met. I have been inspired by those alumni who have overcome their own personal challenges to achieve so much both academically and by those who have taken their own steps to 'pay it forward' through their own enterprises and support people in their own communities and on the wider global platform.



The charity has faced increasing costs over the years, many that have been outside our control and despite our best efforts to minimise expenditure

and to remain sustainable, the difficult decision to sell the estate in order to be able to continue to fund scholarships had to be taken. This autumn the first five students to be sponsored by Pestalozzi to study the IB Diploma at UWC Atlantic College will mark the start of the next incarnation of the scholarship programme. The introduction of the Pestalozzi Development Fund, which will allow more recent alumni to access small grants to set up their own charities or start a social enterprise, will open up new opportunities.

My time at Pestalozzi has been akin to a rollercoaster ride, sometimes fun and packed with laughter and at times challenging. I have experienced so many enjoyable moments with the students and with colleagues, some of whom have become dear friends. Where else would I receive such a unique gift from a graduating student as a photo of their colon! What I can say is that it has never been dull!

The Big Give Christmas Challenge raises £18,915

For the second year running, Pestalozzi took part in the Big Give Christmas Challenge and with your generous donations we managed to raise an incredible £18,915. All the money donated will support the Pestalozzi scholarship programme, enabling bright young people from some of the world's poorest communities to complete their secondary education.

The Big Give's annual Christmas campaign gives charities the opportunity to double their money over a 7 day period via match funding from institutional donors.

Pestalozzi Chief Executive Sue Walton said: "We were delighted to participate in the Big Give again and I want to thank everyone who donated during the campaign."

Prabidhik KC is one of the students who has benefited from the Big Give.

Prabidhik comes from Pyuthan, a hilly district of



Nepal where he lives with his parents, grandfather and three older siblings.

Prabidhik has always had a desire to help others. When he was 15 years-old he wrote his first novel about trafficked girls. The profits he earned went to purchasing

medication for his village after a diarrhoea epidemic. He has now published a second novel and is hoping to give the profits to those who need it back in Nepal.

With regard to his educational ambitions Prabidhik said "Thinking of being a great mathematician and physicist was outside the boundary of possibility back home, but Pestalozzi has helped me push the bounds and now I think the dream is within my sphere of success. Coming here, I can see a big change in myself and how I view the world." Others have noticed the change too and Prabidhik has just been offered a scholarship place at Harvard in the USA.

Sue Walton added: "Successes like Prabidhik's would not be possible without the generosity of individual donors. We are tremendously grateful to everyone who supported us through the Big Give and we look forward to sharing our students' stories with you for many years to come."

Former student Sonam Wangdi raises money for Pestalozzi
