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





### How was your life before Pestalozzi?

We were assisted by my previous school which helped me to realise my results without paying the fees and find a sponsor for my younger brother.

### What subjects do you study at college?


**B:** Biology, Psychology and Mathematics.

# **Summer Volunteering**




**Every summer the students return to their** home countries. Whilst there, many of them undertake a summer volunteering programme which helps them gain additional skills and also shows their commitment to giving back to their home communities. Nepali student, Arpana Nepal, tells us about what she got up to this summer.

This summer I volunteered at a school called Bhanodaya Primary, which is a government school. In Nepal, government schools do not have the same quality education and facilities as the private schools, which is the reason why I found it more beneficial to go there and help the children.

I was given the responsibility of working as a social studies teacher, having to organise a field visit

and making the students prepare reports in teams. On the first day, I found out that a large quantity of water had built up around the school which created a massive problem for the kids coming to school in their uniforms. Before I began the classes, I helped the other teachers to pave the way to school.



In order to get to know the students, we played games in the classroom and the students shared some of their stories. The following two days, I introduced two new topics to each class, asking them questions to make sure they had understood the subject.

The fourth and most important day the students, for the first time, were taken to visit historical and cultural places around their neighbourhood. They learnt about each place and were also asked to note their observations. The students thoroughly enjoyed the trip. The next day, I supervised the students in preparing



their report on the visit. As they had never written a report before, I assisted them with the format, content and presentation.

The sixth and final day, I worked with the students to map the important places in their locality, like health posts and shops. Both projects were then pasted on the walls of their classrooms.

The project developed my ability to explain ideas. Speaking from experience, I noticed a vast difference between the infrastructure in government and private schools. This realisation has inspired me even more to be of some service to government schools in the future. The school was appreciative of my presence. I even succeeded in adopting Pestalozzi's Head, Heart and Hand principles. I educated their minds, I taught them some good habits and I also helped the school in paving the way.

Arpana didn't stop there, she also volunteered for three weeks at her old school, SOS Hermann Gmeiner, in Bhaktapur, Nepal. SOS Children's Villages are one of Pestalozzi's in country partners. Well done Arpana!

# **Country Profile - Nepal**

### **Fact File**

Capital: Kathmandu

Pestalozzi offers scholarships to students from 9 different countries from around the world; one of those countries is Nepal. Pestalozzi has welcomed 108 Nepalese students to the village, with the first group arriving in 1979. We've highlighted some of the key challenges that the country is facing and how our students and alumni want to, and are already making a difference.

## **Current issues in Nepal**

The Federal Democratic Republic of Nepal is a landlocked country in South Asia, bordered by China and India. After ten years of civil war between the government and Maoist rebels, Nepal abolished the monarchy in 2008. The new Constitution was promulgated in 2015, after years of political uncertainty. There are three large problems in Nepal, political unrest, poor education and environmental issues such as earthquakes. Here our current students talk about what they have experienced and how they want to make a difference.

"Brain drain (the flow of skilled human resource to other countries) is a serious problem in Nepal. Every year most of the skilled and semi-skilled people leave the country. Many of my friends are now in Gulf countries (Qatar, Saudi Arabia) earning little money doing laborious manual work. I have made it my aim to decrease the brain drain, I want to show them that we have enough opportunities for work in Nepal. I got this scholarship to help my friends and many Nepalese who are going through my friends' situation. I got this scholarship to change the face of my community and my country." – Aamir Ansari

"I aim to be a zoologist, because Nepal has notable wildlife diversity that needs taking care of. Beyond my professional life, I see myself as an agent of change in my society. All the problems of my country come from illiteracy and ignorance. We have unstable politics because people do not judge the candidates wisely due to lack of awareness, we have unemployment because we have brain drain and we have poverty because people are not educated.

What can I do to solve this? As a student who was offered a good secondary education by the government and also given the extraordinary opportunity of coming to Pestalozzi, I feel like I owe my country even more than a common citizen. Therefore, I wish to empower poor people of my rural village by establishing a proper education centre and education system." – **Samikshya Dhami** 



## How Pestalozzi Alumni are making a difference

There are already a number of Nepalese alumni making a difference in their country and trying to make the world a better place. Here are a few examples of these exceptional individuals.



Ram Krishna Rijal grew up in rural Rukum, where only 10 percent of the village is literate and the closest bus stop was a two-day walk. When he was 10, Ram earned a government scholarship to study in Kathmandu, and later earned scholarships to Pestalozzi and then to Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT). After graduating from MIT in 2012, Ram couldn't wait to return to his home country of Nepal. He had the ambition to set up a network of schools and change the way in which youth are educated in Nepal. Bloom Nepal School was born from this ambition in 2013. After a successful start, the school suffered a devastating setback from the earthquake in April 2015 and is now in the process of being rebuilt.

"We built this school with the idea of making the country 'bloom' by providing quality education to children from even the poorest families," he says. "We realised everyone has a passion. So let's use that passion to create living experts who have a huge contribution to the development — and recovery — of Nepal."

Alongside founding Bloom Nepal, Ram also works for the World Bank in Nepal.

**Santosh Puri** attended Pestalozzi in 2001-2003 and is now a qualified chartered accountant, working for one of the biggest accountancy firms

in the world. "I work hard to support my family in Nepal. I also sponsor a student from a poor economic background to go to a school in Nepal, paying her tuition fees and other related costs. I often take part in fundraising activities for example raising over £1.5k to support the victims of the earthquake."

# **Krishna Gaire** graduated from Pestalozzi in 2014

and is currently studying Computer Engineering at New York University in Abu Dhabi. Krishna, like many other Pestalozzi alumni, considered himself lucky because of the various



opportunities that came his way. He realised that if other students from Nepal were aware of the same opportunities, they too could progress with further education. Krishna has now designed and developed an online forum for Nepalese high school students where anyone can ask questions regarding the College Application process for free (www.collegesodhpuch.com). After setting up the website, he gave a TED Talk on the work that he'd been doing with College Sodhpuch and how he's trying to make other students in Nepal lucky – just like he was.

### Laxmi Rajak

is from the SOS school in Nepal.
After graduationg from Pestalozzi she went to Duke University and studied International Comparative Studies, Mathematics and Education. Laxmi is now working for Teach for Nepal as an Impact Evaluation



Coordinator. Teach for Nepal is committed to ending education inequality in Nepal and offers a two year fellowship teaching in public schools.

With a passion for adventure and a thirst for international travel to far flung places, Victoria managed to convince five of her amazing MBA classmates at Cass Business School (David Aobadia, Tom Clifton, Hussein Daami, Dominic Graham, and Stephanie Wong) to join her in an expedition to explore the world's southernmost tip! Together they trekked over 40km in three short days in the Torres del Paine National Park in Chile. Famed for its stunning mountains, glaciers, lakes, and rivers, Patagonia provided the stunning backdrop to the hike's gruelling pace and sub-zero temperatures.

The itinerary included:

**Day 1:** 11kms ending on a ridge point with a spectacular view of the Cuernos del Diablo (Devil's Horns) - a pair of sharp peaks that jut above Lake Nordenskiold.

**Day 2:** 17kms with a sharp 600m rise in altitude.





Day 3: 12kms around the Grey Lake, home to a glacier 6km wide and over 30m high.

Victoria says, "While we encountered treacherous icy ravines and terrifyingly steep inclines, we put our fearful emotions to one side and pulled together as a team to get everyone to the finish line. We shared a truly amazing experience, made all the more special for the £3,000 we raised for Pestalozzi."

On their return, the Cass trekkers visited Pestalozzi to meet with Chairman of Trustees, Derek Blackman, and the students. They visited the facilities and made an inspirational and heartfelt presentation of their expedition to a packed audience of students and staff. 


## **Quick Updates**

# Founders Day: Early Pestalozzi Children Project Talk by Len Clarke

Monday 24th October 2016 was special for both the Early Pestalozzi Children Project and Pestalozzi. This year, Pestalozzi celebrated "Founders' Day" in recognition of the establishment and origin of the charity. The date was selected for having been the charity's inauguration in 1960.

William Eiducks and Len Clarke, founders of the Early Pestalozzi Children Project, attended and made their annual presentation to the new students as well as the general public about the history of the village. An audience of almost 80 people included former Claverham Secondary School PE teacher, Lee Smith and a former Pestalozzi volunteer house assistant, Mike Neighbour (from 1965). There were also six of the "early Pestalozzi" group present.

Dr Craig Fees, Archivist at the Planned Environment Therapy Trust (PETT), spoke generously about the Early Pestalozzi Children Project and its importance to the histories of a unique charity.

Will and Len concluded the talk with the unveiling of a Founders' display in the entrance of the new Pestalozzi Centre. This important exhibit displays not only the two founders, Dr Henry Alexander and Mrs Mary Buchanan, but also Johann Pestalozzi, Dr Walter Corti (founder of the Swiss Pestalozzi community and inspiration for the British charity) and Eric Bourne (first Warden of the Pestalozzi Children's Village).
